



Where did everyone go?



That says a lot about a city and a way of life that grows even more important as we grow older.









In September, 1958, 568 sophomores entered the doors of F.T.N. We then realized that we must now begin the final preparation for our future.

The first of many assemblies was a pep rally. After this we began to feel more at ease and started to take notice of the numerous happenings at Nicholls.

Sports played an important part in the lives of many boys. Ronald Chapoton, Edwin Geissler, Joe Thomas, Oscar Wible, and Mike Gaudet made the varsity football team. Thirteen other sophomores made the "B" team.

Basketball interested Herb Jennings, John Varnado, and Oscar Wible, who made the varsity team. Those on the junior team were Joe Thomas and Rodney Emmer.

Mike Gaudet, Herb Jennings, Joe Thomas, and Oscar Wible made the baseball team.

Track claimed Lloyd Surbeck, Ronald Chapoton, Roger Lemoine, Norman Hellmers, Edwin Geissler, Ricardo Baltazar, and Frank Lopreore.

Boys weren't the only people who took an interest in sports. Carol Adragna, Linda Gaudet, Sue Jones, and Carol Jeanfreau were the only sophomores to make the state volleyball team.

Melanie Bierhorst went to state for the Girls' Doubles in tennis. Later in the year she placed first in doubles at a tournament in Lafayette. Melanie was rated sixth in the South, and she made the Junior Wightman Cup team which represented Louisiana against tennis squads from other states.

Sophomores made the highest scholastic averages that year. Carol Adragna led the honor roll three times.

A Confederate flag was presented to Nicholls by the Library Club. This flag now hangs in the field house.

The Rebel Yell made all-American for 1958-59.

Five sophomores attended the State Literary Rally at L.S.U. in Baton Rouge. They were as follows: Melanie Bierhorst, mechanical drawing; Judy Ellish, Spanish two; Augusta Ciccio, history; Susan Larsen, French one; and Ronald Wismar, Latin.

Toward the end of our sopho-

more year the election of cheerleaders was held. Melanie Bierhorst and Karen Schiro were elected as cheerleaders. Betty Stegall was elected as first alternate.

Last on the list of sophomore activities was the selection of flagbearers. Emily Caillouette was selected as one of the bearers. Judy Ellish, Karen Altmann, and Carol Marsh were selected as alternates.

In our junior year the momentum picked up. Twenty-eight members of the class were tapped into the National Honor Society for possessing outstanding qualities in character, leadership, scholarship, and service.

In sports, Ronald Chapoton received the award for the best back on the 1959 football team.

Oscar Wible led the city scorers and broke the school record with 402 points during the basketball season.

Barbara Avenel and Joy Bolton made the state volleyball team, and Joy Jacob went to state for doubles in tennis.

Jonell Cain and Judy Fairchild were named maids in the 1959 homecoming court.

Once again **The Rebel Yell** was rated all-American by the National Scholastic Press Association.

That year the Nicholls band was one of the largest ever—100 marching members. Larry Simpson, Betty Jean Miller, and Ricardo Baltazar auditioned for the all-State band which was held in Baton Rouge.


The competition for state rally was stiff that year. Those juniors participating were Beth Morvant, Carol Adragna, Audrey Schmidt, Donna Harrison, Goerge Daigle, Sue Larsen, and Bill Everett.

Again came the election of cheerleaders and flagbearers. Elected as cheerleaders were Melanie Bierhorst, Mary Kathryn Rohr, and Kitty Schiro. Kitty was selected head cheerleader by the others. Sherry Waite was chosen as an alternate. Flagbearers were Karen Altmann, Darlene Edgecombe, Judy Ellish, Carol Marsh, and Jo Ann Uhl. Emily Caillouette was selected head flagbearer.

Melanie Bierhorst won the title of club champion of the New Orleans Women's Tennis Club at City Park.

Eight girls and five boys attended Pelican Girls' State and Boys' State in Baton Rouge.
